

Laredo is HOW old?

In 1745, as per the <u>Texas Historical Archives</u>, a fort was established along the Rio Grande River by a Spanish Army officer who called it "El Paso de Jacinto." It was originally just a river crossing named for a descendant of Alfonso de Leon's named <u>Jacinto</u> de Leon, who had discovered a place where a man on horseback might cross the Rio Grande.

The site was located near a Land Grant which was subsequently made by Spanish Royal Viceroy José de Escandón to Tomás Sánchez de la Barrera y Gallardo (another Spanish officer) who brought four families to the site in 1755 & founded the Villa de Laredo. It was part of the Nuevo Santander region in the Spanish colony of New Spain, & although the origin of the name is unclear, both Santander & Laredo are names of ports in northern Spain, so.....! (Between 1745 & 1755, the area remained in the hands of the native Indians....Karankawas, Lipan Apaches & the Comanches).

From four families to a population of approximately 250,000.....Laredo is now the third most populous city on the United States-Mexican border. This is the city where some of us grew up, where we have friends & relatives, and, for most of us, the place we remember with fondness!

It should be noted here that our own Delia Sánchez (Mrs. Cael González) is a direct descendant of Don Tomas Sánchez! Maybe there are other descendants in our group? We do have several SANCHEZes, after all!



Besides the Texas Archives, there are many good websites designed by folks like John Adams, Jr., Cuauhtemoc Rocha, & Maria Eugenia Guerra, to name a few, that document Laredo's history with wonderful old photos going back in time. The two above are of the Federal (Post Office) building, left, & of ladies sitting in Jarvis Plaza, across from the old Hamilton Hotel (when it had just 3 floors).

The Federal Building was built in 1907 & has served as a Post Office, Courthouse & Custom House. Jarvis Plaza was named for Samuel Matthias Jarvis, a great-great grandfather of our own Nancy Foster Ager!



Mr. Jarvis was born in New York City, but joined Gen. Zachary Taylor & Winfield Scott's armies & fought in Mexico. In Vallecillos, Nuevo Leon, he met & married Inocencia Flores & after the Civil War, they settled in Laredo. Samuel M. Jarvis served as Mayor, Webb County Judge, Customs Collector, & County Surveyor. As the County Surveyor, he named many of Laredo's downtown streets in alternating fashion for Mexican & American political & military heroes; i.e., Zaragoza/ Grant—Iturbide/LincoIn—HidaIgo/Farragut—Matamoros/Houston—Victoria/Washington, etc! (Now we know the rest of the story)!




Those Were the Days, my Friend!





The seventh flag was that of the short-lived Republic of the Rio Grande, of which Laredo was the capital!



Are there any CANTU's in the group, besides Mine Cantú Barrera (on the left, below)? (And Mine, our sincere condolences on the recent passing of your husband, Ramiro!). On a historical note, there was a young man named David B. Barkley, born in Laredo to Josef & Antonia Cantú in 1899 who was the first Hispanic recipient of the Medal of Honor in World War One! Private Cantú performed heroically on a scouting mission by swimming the Meuse River in France to gather behind-the-lines information on German troops. He is buried at Ft. Sam Houston in San Antonio after lying in State at the Alamo. (Dyess AFB near Abilene was once called Camp Barkeley & was later renamed Dyess AFB, after Col. William Dyess, an Abilene hero). (Nevertheless, Barkley was not forgotten in Laredo)!


